#### MEMORABLE MONDAY

At the time of writing, I haven't seen today's Gloucester side, but if things go as seems likely, I would imagine that the two teams should be pretty evenly matched. Time will tell.

But anyway, we're in for an enjoyable afternoon, and we all hope that the lads from the Mersey find their visit memorable.

Our home season closes next Saturday with the visit from Sale, always forthright opposition, and a team worth watching. Did you notice that ex-England Captain and scrum-half, Steve Smith, came out of retirement to help his old club out of an injury crisis a week or two ago? #### TYING 'EM UP IN NOTTS

As you will know by now, Nottingham have elected to make our final League game, on April 28th, an all-ticket affair. Seems sensible to me, and as there are no regulations laid down about such matters in the Courage Clubs Championship, they're quite entitled to do what they like.

They are also perfectly at liberty to restrict us to ground tickets, reserving their very small

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amount of Stand space for their own regulars. After all, we did very much the same thing when Bath came, under similar circumstances, at the beginning of the season.

Anyway, they have sent us 2,000 Ground Tickets, which is just about half of their capacity, so that's reasonable. These will go on sale — to Members only, on production of Membership Card tomorrow evening, Tuesday, in the Social Club at 7.30. They cost £3.00.

That same Members-only exercise will be repeated on Thursday — same time, same place — and then, any which have not been sold will be available at the Sale game on the 21st.

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## TALKING RUGBY with Steve Fraser

What if Gloucester end up with nothing?

The possibility of a League and Cup double is so attractive that the danger of defeat at both Beeston and Twickenham has been rather overlooked.

Yet an improving Nottingham and a Bath side desperate to salvage something this season are a formidable prospect.

Despite recent indifferent performances, Gloucester should win at least one of the trophies they are chasing.

But even if the unthinkable happened and they did finish empty handed, this has been a season to savour.

The first match of the League campaign gave little hint of what was to come. The result, a 16-12 win at Moseley, was the right one but the performance left a lot to be desired.

It was the second League match where it all came together. Mighty Bath had won all the important meetings between the two sides in recent seasons but this time they did not get a look in, going down 13-6.

The Cherry and Whites have won all the important matches they have played at Kingsholm but it is their away wins which have been the most memorable this season.

No one who was at Sudbury will forget Richard Mogg's last minute try against Wasps in the first round of the Pilkington Cup.

But equally spectacular in other ways were the League wins against Leicester and Bristol.

When Gloucester went to the Memorial Ground in November, Bristol had emerged as one of the title favourites. But the pack were devestating that day and there was only ever going to be one winner.

When Gloucester went to Welford Road, Leicester had not been beaten for 13 months. For 40 minutes they looked capable of preserving that record but an outstanding solo performance by Marcus Hannaford helped Gloucester turn the tables.

The Cup quarter-final with Nottingham also produced a cracking match with Gloucester again coming back from behind. Everyone will have their own favourite

matches. For me, the most enjoyable — probably because there was no pressure on either side — was the anniversary match with British Police.

Those who went along to Kingsholm that night saw a supremely entertaining exhibition of open rugby crowned with an avalanche of tries

It is a pity the season does not leave room for more matches like that.
