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

GOING BACK A BIT

Fred Lovesy, who lived on the Cross, and was the Terry Tandy of his day, wrote in his Secretary's notebook, "A fairly good opening game, but Gloucester were rather scraggy or would have scored more. Clifton smart with their feet."

I'm not quite sure what Mr. Lovesy meant by that word 'scraggy', but no doubt it spoke volumes at the

Just to complete the story, the tries were scored by P. Stout and G. F. Clutterbuck (2), with A. Stephens scoring the other and converting it himself. The Club took £20.00 on the gate.

I don't know how smart Clifton are with their feet this season (or for that matter, how 'scraggy' Gloucester are likely to be), but it's surely a good thing to maintain ties of this antiquity with a fine old respected club like Clifton. time to time.



TALKING RUGBY with Mike Harris



With the introduction of a league system to England, many small ambitious clubs have seen the chance to join the top flight.

Clifton, who visit Kingsholm this evening, have followed the example of many of the more illustrious clubs (with the notable exception of Gloucester) and attracted players from other leading sides before the start of the season. Having won promotion for the second successive year at the end of last season, Clifton will be playing in National League Division Three this season — only two divisions below Gloucester.

And their ambition to win promotion for a third successive season is a realistic one.

During the summer Clifton have recruited several top class players including former Bath full back Phil Cue, Bristol flanker Peter Polledri, Bath centre Ben Cundy, Bath winger Barry Trevaskis and Bristol back row man Tim Edbrook. In addition Clifton can now draw upon the vast experience of former Bristol winger Alan Moreley who has been appointed the club's new coach this year.

Last season Gloucester travelled to Clifton and narrowly beat the Bristol side 7-19.

This evening's encounter should be just as tough for the cherry and whites and it gives some of the new players at Kingsholm this season a chance to prove themselves.

Ian Morgan, Jerry Perrins, Peter Miles and Dave Parry will all be trying to impress the selectors in their first full game for Gloucester.
