




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

CRUCIAL ENCOUNTER

We all remember the traumatic afternoon at Beeston — April 28th, actually — when losing to Nottingham deprived us of the Courage Clubs Championship. Nevertheless, the initial damage had been done at Kingsholm. on November 25th. That day, Saracens fought us to a highly creditable draw, 21 points each, and with the odd lucky bounce or two in the final stages, could even have gone home with a win. If that game had gone according to the form book, the April showdown would have been irrelevant.

It's also worth pointing out that the wiseacres, at the start of last season, sniffed at the 'Sarries', referring to them as 'one season wonders', and prophesying that they'd be back down into the Second Division in the shortest possible time. In fact, everything is in the melting pot, and today's matches may do a great deal to stabilise things. Quite apart from all that, it's nice to see the lads from North London back again. We've had some good Rugby from our meetings in the past, and there seems no reason why that should change today.

One 'Elver Eater' who will be looking forward to this afternoon's festivities more than somewhat is Nick Marment, and not only because he's an ex-Saracen himself. Just about the first time I ever saw him playing on the wing was in a John Player Cup match against the 'Sarries'; one which turned out to be a fairly close affair until 'Marmite' got away and

scored the crucial try.

I'm told he's back at full back today, Tim Smith having bent his hooter, the position he usually played at Southgate. THOSE PRICES

Some people have been getting their Y-fronts in a lather over the prices charged at Wasps and at Rosslyn Park for the recent League games. Of course, it all makes useful journalistic copy, but our own Intrepid Investigative Reporter — one T. Tandy Esq. — has been doing his own research and got the following information from the clubs in

Wasps are quite unrepentant about it; they do put their prices up to £4.00 for all League games, and weren't discriminating against Gloucester in that respect. In spite of anything you may have heard, their bar prices don't change at all, whatever the game. If you've bought a beer in a London pub lately, you'll know what that implies.

Rosslyn Park, quite simply, charge £5.00 for admission for all their games, League or not. Apparently, they have very high overheads and run

eleven sides, all of which have to be paid for. If you want to watch 'Park' that's what you pay.

I suppose that Rugby is no different from anything else - it costs more in London.

One good thing about the contretemps is that it has pointed out to us what good value for money we're getting at Kingsholm at £3.00 for entry to one of the best grounds in the country. Terry Tandy's enquiries only found one lower price, and that was at Leicester, where they can seat all 14,000 spectators for £2.20 a behind. Part of the reason for that is that it costs less to administer an all-seater ground — fewer stewards needed, for example. Of course, it takes an awful lot of capital to set that system up in the first place, and some people don't want to sit down, anyway.

I'm also asked to point out that, although supporters were warned beforehand of the prices at Rosslyn Park, it doesn't seem as though many of us were deterred from going up and cheering the lads on; a circumstance which was greatly appreciated by the players, and for which they relay their

thanks.

THANKS TO ARJO MECANAIDS

We have a lot of splendid organisations who sponsor games at Kingsholm, but there aren't that many who can claim to be the undisputed world leaders in their field. Today's generous benefactors can, and what's more, they're our next door neighbours. A win today would put the cherry and whites in the middle of the table with the realistic prospect of finishing near the top next April.

They have won both their home league games to date and will aim to maintain that

Gloucester look set to wait for at least another season before winning their first Courage Division One title.

Barring an unlikely string of defeats for Bath and Leicester there is no way the cherry and whites can make up the ground they have already lost this season.

Last weekend's 17-12 loss to Rosslyn Park leaves them ninth in the table with just two win from five games.

And with only seven games left in the league season it is unrealistic to hope that they can make up three wins on top of the table Bath.

Gloucester's aim today, therefore, will be to consolidate their league position before their next Courage Division One game in January.

Saracens showed last season that they are an extremely dangerous and exciting side. They are currently struggling near the foot of the table but Gloucester will not be complacent about their task as they seemed to be last year when letting Saracens fight back for an unlikely draw at Kingsholm.

To counter the Londoners' mobile style, Gloucester have brought back Dave Sims into the second row. He is the only change in the pack from the side which played Rosslyn Park and behind the scrum Chris Dee comes in at
