OUR VISITORS TODAY GLOUCESTER

FOUNDED - 1873

Our biggest win so far over Gloucester came on 12/10/85 across the road at Twickenham. The only survivors from our team that day who are still in the 1st XV squad are Stuart Thresher, Rob Glenister and Micky Skinner. In the first half we led 17-0 with tries from David Cooke, Jamie Salmon and Rob Glenister and one conversion and a penalty by Marcus Rose. After half time Rob Glenister completed his hat trick of tries (Micky Skinner, Simon Cooke and Andre Dent got the others) and with Marcus Rose (2) and Stuart Thresher (1) kicking conversions this took our total to 43 points and as Gloucester could only manage a try from the referee (penalty!!) and a conversion by S. Lazenby this left the final score at 43-6

Last season we met twice at Kingsholm, once in the Cup (26/1/91) and once in the League (27/4/91). The Cup game was the all important one and we got off to a flyer – going into the lead after only six minutes with Andrew Harriman scoring and David Pears kicking the conversion. T. Smith replied with a penalty goal, but Stuart Thresher (try) and David Pears (conversion) stretched our lead to 12-3 at half time. David Pears kicked what proved to be the tie winning penalty after sixty minutes, because Gloucester came back to score tries in the seventy-sixth and eight-second minutes through M. Hamlin and N. Marment, and had T. Smith been able to convert both, the score would have been 15-15. As it was he was only able to convert the second, and so we won 15-13 and then went on to win the Cup in May.

The League meeting was ruined as a close contest because we rested our entire first XV as the Cup Final was the next week. Gloucester took full advantage and scored tries through P. Ashmeade, C. Dee (2), D. Sims and I. Smith (2) with M. Roberts licking four conversions and two penalties. We could only manage tries from Mike Wedderburn, Mike Molyneux and Jeff Alexander (who also kicked one penalty and two conversions). His second conversion enabled us to finish above Leicester on points difference. Final score 19-38.

Gloucester currently lie in 5th position in the league with a record of P11 W7 D1 L3 F175 A147 Pts15. They have played against Leicester (H) 21-3, Rugby (A) 19-16, Nottingham (A) 14-3, Rosslyn Park (H) 12-9, Saracens (A) 12-12, Bath (A) 9-29, Northampton (H) 10-17, London Irish (H) 22-15, Orrell (A) 12-18, Bristol (H) 29-15 and last week Wasps (H) 15-10.
