"In Hertford, Hereford or Hampshire, hurricanes hardly happen." declaims Eliza Doolittle. Which just goes to show that old George Bernard Shaw may have been a whizz at writing plays, but didn't know a whole lot about rugby football.

At any rate, there was a pretty fair old breeze at Basingstoke, just a two or three years ago, when Hampshire blew Gloucestershire away to the tune of 22 points to 6. Anyone who thinks of that lovely county's sporting prowess simply in terms of David Gower and Malcolm Marshall should be reminded that their sportsmen are just as adept in the 'muddied oafs' department as they are in the one reserved for 'flannelled fools'. Not that there aren't similarities between the ways in which today's very welcome visitors play their cricket and their rugby. They both know precisely what is expected of them if they are to proceed in the competition. The present structure of the County Championship allows no margin for error whatsoever, so, even before the competition started, we were pretty sure there would be a 'crunch match' element about Gloucestershire v. Hampshire at Lydney on October 2nd. In other words, we're in for a good game.

It wouldn't be right to conclude without saying, once again, a heartfelt 'thanks' to the Lydney Club for entertaining us today. Our hosts can always be relied upon to make meticulous arrangements and generally ensure that things go well. We couldn't wish for a better venue to celebrate our only home game in the season which sees our return to Division One.

And the Hampshire contingent should be warned. We have every intention of staying there. After all, Forest fires have been known to be fanned by hurricanes before.
