We want a noisy and fiercely partisan crowd - but in the right spirit and at the right time.

Speaking for myself - and I'm sure for a great many other Gloucester supporters - I can say that I have had some great times with the Orrell fans. They know their rugby (and their beer), they are always good for a laugh, and enjoy a good crack, on just about any subject under the sun. Speaking as a good Barton lad, I always feel very much at home with the fellows from Wigan, whether we're forgathering in Gloucester or Points North. Football apart, what more can we ask.?

My caller, Mr. Paul Hardiman from 32 Ralph Road, Horfield, Bristol, opened his conversation by telling me that he was so incensed by the article that "I felt I must ring and tell somebody that not all us Bristol supporters feel like that."

Apparently, Paul was, in fact, born in the Dean's Walk area, but left at the age of six, and hadn't been back to Kingsholm since. It wasn't surprising, therefore, that he and his travelling companion found themselves in the Dean's Walk Inn before the game. "The place was heaving with red-and-white shirts, he told me, and quite frankly, we wondered what we had got ourselves into."

But he needn't have worried. The Gloucester lads welcomed the visitors into their midst, and so well did they get on, that the locals invited them to join them for the match. In the Shed, naturally.

"It was absolutely great!" he went on. "Pity about the result, from our point of view, but we loved the company. Yes - they're partisan, all right, but that's what it's all about. There's certainly no malice in it."

But I really liked his closing remarks. "We were fairly buzzing all the way home." said Dave Hardiman. "Usually, if Bristol are playing a long way away, we slide over the Bridge and watch Cardiff. Not any more though. From now on, it's Kingsholm for us!"

Isn't that great? After all, Dave didn't absolutely have to make an expensive, long distance call did he? We do appreciate the thought. Nevertheless, we must also take serious account of the burden of the Chairman's contribution on the subject, and regard the Hardiman experience as a super example of the way Gloucester supporters ought to behave, and as the majority of them do. I only hope that the contretemps doesn't put Dave Hardiman, and others like him, visiting what is still the finest rugby venue in the country.

JACK PRICE

Jack Price died over last weekend. Perhaps not a name which is immediately thrown into the conversation when the topic turns to old-time Gloucester greats, but nevertheless, Jack was the embodiment of the honest, wholehearted player and supporter on which the Club was founded, and on which it still, to a large extent, depends.

Jack was one of those products of the Thirties whose sides and players have a secure niche in Gloucester's mythology. His heroes were the likes of Dix, Millington and McCanlis. He played for Gloucester alongside many of them; not often, it's true, but enough to say he'd pulled on the cherry-and-white shirt. Most of his appearances were for the United, and he was equally proud of having been a regular member of the all-conquering Atlas Works side - Fielding and Platt, to the uninitiated - who swept all before them for a few seasons.

After he hung up his boots, he became a regular at the Worcester Street end, just like his ancestors before him, and hardly missed a game for many years. He was proud of his son, Mike, who is now Mayor's Officer to the Metropolitan Borough of Sandwell, in Birmingham, but cocked a quizzical eyebrow when offspring deserted Dad for the breezier pastures of the Tump, whereof



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he is a denizen to this very day.

I never heard Jack Price use two words where one would do, and he'd come back and haunt me if he thought I was going on too long. So, in sending out condolences to his family, I'll simply say "Hail and Farewell, Jack Price. You were the of the stuff which Gloucester RFC was made on."

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THE GLOUCESTER RUGBY FOOTBALL

Back in September 1982, Gloucester got off to the dismal start. The season opened at Fromehall Park with a 21-16 loss against Stroud. It was much the same against Swansea at Kingsholm - the Welsh side won 23-16. Then Lydney visited for a midweek match and Gloucester managed an 18-12 win, but on the Saturday came a tough encounter at Coundon Road that saw John Gadd and John Orwin both limp off as with injuries as Gloucester went down 12-10 against Coventry.

So when Gloucester travelled to the leafy London suburbs of Roehampton on Wednesday September 15 to play Rosslyn Park, there was an air of optimism that perhaps the season could start to get going in the wins department. It was in vain as the club founded by C.C. Hoyer Millar in 1879 swept aside Gloucester 17-9.

What makes this particular match of significance today is that a young flanker made his Gloucester first team debut at Rosslyn Park - and that was exactly 300 appearances ago.

Ian Smith, son of Dick Smith, could well have a little niche in the history books. He must be one of the very few players from a senior club to have had a proverbial "early bath" in a debut match!

The Citizen headline the following day read:

Flanker sent-off, but there is . . . HOPE FOR BATTLING GLO'STER

Andrew Wise, the then "scribe from St. John's Lane" wrote in the September 16 Citizen: Beleaguered Gloucester hit more trouble at Roehampton last night, having flanker Ian Smith sent off on his debut, and slipping to their fourth defeat in five games this season.

With Gadd and Orwin both injured, Gloucester fielded a makeshift pack that evening - Adrian Turton, selected at Number 8, replaced Orwin in the second row, up and coming back row Mike Teague came into the side at Number 8 for his first game of the season, and Jeremy Bennett coming in for Gadd at Number 6.

During the first half, Paul Wood, the other flanker, came off injured and was replaced by Smith who, according to Wise, made an impressive debut.

The sending-off came at the game's "death". Smith's sending off, along with Park prop Paul Curtis, came in controversial circumstances two minutes into injury time. Andrew Wise wrote. Curtis was ordered off for kicking hooker Kevin White and Smith ... retaliated with a punch and was dismissed. It was a sad end to an encouraging start for the son of club coach Dick Smith. He had looked quick and positive in attack and was involved in the sustained pressure which led to Gloucester's one try of the game.

Not suprisingly, Rosslyn Park pack tended to dominate. Not only was the home pack much bigger and heavier, it also contained internationals Neil Mantell and Andy Ripley. And if that were not enough, Mantell was partnered in the second row by one Paul Ackford who was soon to get international recognition.

For the record, Gloucester's scoring that evening was a try 10 minutes from the end by Paul Taylor, converted by Mike Hamlin who had earlier kicked a dropped goal. For Rosslyn Park, unconverted tries came from Dermont Cullen and Stuart Archer, with Mike Greenhalgh kicking three penalties.

But Gloucester did touch down on a further two occasions. Wise wrote: Twice Nick Price was robbed of a try by bad luck - the first occasion he looked to have got the decision from referee Peter Kingham after catching a deft cross kick from Mike Hamlin and diving over in the corner. The London Society referee at first signalled the score, then changed his mind and said that the Gloucester winger had been bundled into touch in goal. And three minutes before half time Price was again unfortunate when Mr. Kingham adjudged that his touch down after an upfield chase had come just after the ball had crossed the dead ball line.

The 1982 season is perhaps best remembers as being the last occasion when Gloucester played both Oxford and Cambridge Universities. And playing for Oxford at fly half against the Cherry and Whites (October 30 at Iffley Road) was one S. Barnes. Four days later at Kingsholm, turning out for Cambridge University at fly half was one R. Andrew. Gloucester won both matches - 34-9 against the Dark Blues and 33-9 against the Light Blues.
