





A few words from the Chairman...

It took less than two minutes, but again at the Semi Final stage the number one ball - Bath would not come out first and we travel once again to the Stoop. John Quin and I were at Twickenham for the Draw and have requested our full allocation of tickets for the match - so let's give John Hall and his Team our full support. My first six months in the Chair has whistled by and I have learned a great deal about the complex and exciting enterprise which is our Club. I hope you agree that your Management Committee are going in the right direction, in a purposeful and harmonious fashion, in the many aspects of the business we have to conduct. Our relationships with the Press (with just one exception!), with the City Council and our sometimes vociferous neighbours are much improved - to our mutual benefit.

The way in which the pitch has stood up to the constant drenching right from the first week of the season is due to the new drainage and in no small way the care and attention of Richard Seaman and his crew, for which we are most appreciative. In the Teacher's Stand we have a superb acquisition which has not only given the Club a splendid facility at the south end, but has enabled the Members Bar to be extended into the accommodation previously set aside for sponsors. Now we are planning for a new West Stand, but only if and when the funding is in place - watch this space! However, our first priority is to find the alternative for Lambridge as Bath City Council is looking to develop its Park and Ride. Rest assured, we are working closely to provide enhanced facilities for our Players for playing and training with adequate lighting and Club facilities. The discussion and options are going forward with the City Council; with both sides looking at the developments as an opportunity for more and better facilities for the Club, not simply as a replacement. It is imperative that we provide simply the best conditions for our players to train and play and we shall not waver from this objective.

Richard Hill has advised and influenced the way forward with the development of our young players. With some reluctance, but with the belief in our foresight, Bath has abandoned its

Under 21 side to concentrate on the Emerging Players and reorganising the needs and planning to strengthen the 18 year old group and also the Spartans. We are concerned with the care and welfare of the young players coming to the Club and hope we can provide the accommodation and counselling, besides the playing and training facilities, as we encourage the best young players in the country to come to Bath.

Following the proposals at the last AGM to bring about changes in the Club's Rules, I have a small working group looking at the Model Rules recently published by the RFU. This move towards "Incorporation" may not be the most exhilarating of our activities in the Club, but in parallel with the Inland Revenue examination of our income and expenditure going back over the last six year, running a rugby club is not all excitement I can tell you!

In keeping with the high profile of Bath, what a pleasure it has been to congratulate our new Internationals this season: Mike Catt, Dave Hilton and Eric Peters, together with the numerous A Internationals, Emerging Players and England Colts. Who will forget the look on Dave's face after that fantastic last minute Scottish win in Paris? I look forward to fifteen such faces on May 6 at Twickenham. (English I hope! Ed.)

There are numerous other matters to which I would have liked to refer, but space does not permit. However, just one little matter with which I might leave you: "Why doesn't somebody in the Club come up with a Club song for us to sing around the terraces?" The President has tried to persuade me on several long journeys to away matches that he has the answer to this, but he has not been able to persuade me that those words he keeps warbling measure up to Jerusalem or Sweet Chariots!!

Today we welcome our great rivals from Gloucester. We are privileged to have as our guests, the Mayor and Mayoress of Bath, and the President of the RFU, Mr Dennis Easby and his wife.

I look forward to maintaining our winning ways.
