


To be sure we are. One job is

iew from the Terraces

A bright, shining light illuminated one side of the first team pitch on Sat. 1st April during the match against Mosely. Austin Healey took up the ball and sprinted 75 yards down the touchline to score a try at the club house end. During the course of his run he thrice employed a fast, crisp sidestep to leave defenders leaden-footed and floundering in his wake. Hallelujah! King Barry lives. His genes are in the club Draught Bass and pies and are beginning to bear fruit.

For the speccies it has been a tense, demanding season. Nerves are fraught, nails are bitten down to the elbow. Every league match has been like a semi-final. For myself one word sums up this season bewilderment. I am bewildered by the R.F.U. How can they get things so wrong? Why was it necessary to have half the league games after Xmas? Did they perhaps intend to cause an end of season cock-up as a jape? Are they even now wetting their draws cellular chortling over their G&Ts in the board room at Twickers? I am bewildered by the rules which, perhaps through sheer laziness, I haven't worked out yet. But I have this uneasy feeling that they aren't quite right. Although I cannot put my finger on what is wrong, I do know that you only get a good game when one side is markedly superior in ability to its opponents. Two evenly matched sides invariably produce a turgid stalemate resolved by the accuracy of the kickers.

I am bewildered by the line-outs - that other version of the National Lottery - and I am concerned that they distort the game. If you haven't got a couple of bean poles in your side you can forget about getting a decent supply of ball to develop your attack. It is wrong that in a team game of 15 players one position should be of such overwhelming importance. I have a simple solution to the manifold problems of the line-out. All the players in the line-out should be on their knees. This would eliminate lifting. It would stop players charging through the line-out. The ref would clearly be able to detect misdemeanours and height wouldn't be of such importance, although I suppose Northampton would scour the world for someone with arms like a mountain gorilla. If this is not acceptable I would still certainly legislate against players charging through the line-out. Mostly they are in front of the ball but rarely are they penalised and they do nothing but cause a mess and prevent the ball getting into open play. What often results is what I believe is called a 'rolling maul'. This reminds me of the old Roman testudo, or

shield wall, behind which soldiers would hide for protection and move forward. When my own side is doing it I get this gut feeling of triumph, but when the opposition are doing it I get this feeling of intense irritation with the whole procedure. The oddest thing about it all is that you can't nip round the side of the shield, grab the bloke with the ball and smack him down. It is against the rules. And yet I thought that this was what the game was all about. My solution would be to get another Roman artillery piece called a trebuchet, fill the bowl full of ordure and fling it over the lot of them.

I am bewildered by the turnover of players. Not long ago we had a stable 1st team and a stable 2nd team and so on and when someone was missing from the 1st team someone would move up from the 2nd team and so on. But I have been to watch the 2nd team a few times and it has never been the same team twice. I'm forever asking 'who's that?', 'where's so and so?' A week or so later you find out that 'so and so' is now playing at Waterloo or somewhere and whoever 'that' was has disappeared without trace. Perhaps a permanent notice on the notice board logging arrivals and departures would help us keep abreast of developments I am further bewildered by the lack of fixtures, although I am not sure whether this is a bewilderment or a grouse. From the beginning of December to the end of March a mere 5 1st team matches were played at home and two of these were cup ties. With bad luck in the draw we would have had only three home fixtures. Poor sustenance for a red blooded male, or female for that matter. Much of the problem has been caused by teams from lower divisions not fulfiling their fixtures. I am firmly of the belief that now is the time to enlarge the First Division to 12 teams, or maybe more, because these are the only fixtures that seem to mean anything. Now to matters less contentious. If you are

a Gloucester speccy reading this then let me tell you, you are very welcome here today. Having been born and bred in the heartland of Rugby League I have not always found what I perceive to be the forward orientated play of your team entirely to my taste, but I do admire your club spirit and what, from a distance, seems to be the dignified way your club has approached the era of cheque book rugby. May you survive and prosper.

Should people on the terraces comment on team tactics and style of play? Perhaps we don't know what we are talking about, but

what we do know is that we have two cracking wingers who perform heroics in defence but who, many of us feel, are not given enough responsibility in attack. In the old days the job of the forwards was to get the ball out to the backs so that they could pass it to the wings, who were virtually told to get on with it. If they didn't score you would curse them. I know that now the game is faster, players are fitter and defences are tighter but even so our wingers do not see enough of the ball. Think back to the great John Carleton. When the ball went across the line to the wing you knew with certainty that he would beat the first man. Usually he beat the second man as well and very often he would beat three. These wingers can do it given the chance. They can use speed, change of pace, swerve, sidestep, hand off or even use the boot. A great punt back into the middle of the field for the forwards to chase, once known as a Garryowen, a low kick down the touchline a la Offiah or even hoof down the touchline to turn the full

It is hard to accept that as far as I know this is the last season for three of our very best players. Dewi has been an inspiration and driving force for a number of years. It is not long since he inspired us to within a whisker of winning the championship. He was at his best then. I hope he doesn't retire altogether. He has too much talent and you are a long time retired. Simon of course retired last season but his left boot made a comeback. God bless his left boot. It has been as consistent this season as at any time during his career and as much as anything has been instrumental in averting the threat of relegation. And what can I say about Clearo? Hacks would drag out the cliches such as 'loyal servant' and 'old warhorse' but neither would be accurate or do him justice. Clearo isn't a servant, he is a warrior and although he has been at the club many years if it hadn't been for his unfortunate injury I am sure he had a few good years left in him. On the terraces he will be remembered for his skill, commitment, courage and those great surging runs scattering the ranks of the opposition like chaff.

Finally I should like you to support the nomination of Mother Wood of Twickenham (Dudley that is) for the Nobel Peace Prize for services to the poor of Twickenham and to Brian Moore, for defying the POOFS (Pundits and Old Officer Farts), must go the No Bull Prize for calling a spade a killing the ball.
