For anyone whose ignorance is as unpardonable as my own, I can tell you that, roughly speaking, Dunvant is about half-way between Llanelli and Swansea, but further south than either, which, I suppose, makes them just about the furthest flung of any Welsh side to come here. And they're all the more welcome for that.

Tonight's visitors are the best current example of the cyclic nature of the game. Sides rise to the top, have their brief hour of glory, and then sink again, sometimes nevermore to scale the dizzy heights. In the Welsh arena, one can think of teams, like South Wales Police and Glamorgan Wanderers, who have proved genuine handfuls (hands full ?) for Gloucester for a decade or so, only to disappear from the scene. In their place arise the Dunvants and the Treorchies of this world. If ever there was a justification for the League system, allowing teams to show what they can do, rather than leaving the fixture list to the whims of fixture secretaries, then Dunvant is it.

At the moment, and it is to be hoped for ever more, there is no doubt that tonight's welcome visitors are right there with the best of Welsh sides. Their climb into the Heineken First Division was spectacular, and they've had their share, and more, of memorable wins since they achieved that status. We are well aware that Dunvant is a side to be reckoned with, and we won't be taking them lightly.

As I say, this will be the first time that many of this evening's visitors will ever have been entertained at Kingsholm. We wish them well for the rest of the season, and hope they thoroughly enjoy tonight's festivities.

NEW TERRITORY - OR IS IT?

This evening, Gloucester enters new territory. Not only is it the first official "Anglo-Welsh" fixture to be played at Kingsholm, but it is also the very first occasion that the Cherry and Whites have met Dunvant. Over the past century, there have been a whole host of clubs from the Principality that have played Gloucester. Some of these clubs still remain in the top flight of the Welsh game, while others are now among the "junior" ranks. So tonightis game kicks-off with a completely clean sheet. The other aspect of this game is the "Anglo-Welsh" part. I used the word "official" for a very good reason. This is because as long ago as 100 years there was a sort of Anglo-Wélsh league. The top four Welsh clubs of the day and the top four English clubs near to the border (Gloucester, Bristol, Moseley and Coventry) all met each other home and away every season. This prompted the legendary Bill Bailey to devise a "league" table of the eight clubs. Highly unofficial, but it augers the question: Was this the earliest attempt in rugby union to produce a "table" as we know it today?

Looking at this day in Gloucester history, we find that seventy years ago, on Saturday October 2, 1926, the visitors to Kingsholm were St. Thomas' Hospital who at the time were the holders of the Hospital Cup, a competition between the great London "teaching" hospitals when medical students were hard-drinking, hard rugby-playing "doctors in the house". The "Hospital" ended the match with 13 players (injuries, not red-cards!) and were dispatched 20-14 by the Cherry and Whites. Bill Bailey remarks in that evenings "Pink 'Un"...

It was a game in patches this afternoon, some entertaining football being intermixed with numerous mistakes in handling which put an end to some promising combined movements. Gloucester again scored freely, obtaining six tries to their opponents' two, but the goal kicking was poor, only one place kick being successful.

Gloucester, as in the Moseley match, did all their best work in the first half. The Hospital were by no means outclassed, but in actual play the City held a big advantage, and three tries did not indicate the home team's superiority. But there was a falling off after the change of ends, and though many attacks were initiated, finishing was often wanted. On the other hand, Hospital worked suprisingly well after losing their second player, and the dropped goal by Cooper and the try by Robinson were well deserved scores. The Gloucester forwards did well up to a point, but there was a lack of cohesion.... In the open, the Hospital men were quite the equals of the home eight, but were beaten in the loose, where the Gloucester men showed skilful dribbling at times. Hemming, in the long line out, did some effective work, but the pack failed to keep up the form displayed in the early stages.

Behind, the City were faulty in combination, and the passing broke down badly on occasions. Milliner accomplished a lot of good things at the scrum, and Taylor, though obviously suffering from lack of training, made one or two good openings and kicked well. Hughes and Thompson formed the strongest wing at three-quarter in attack and the latter's three tries stood out amongst the features of the game... Like Gloucester, the Hospital have several players on the injured list, and were unlucky to have two more casualties this afternoon. However, it was an enjoyable game, if the play did not reach a high standard at times, and St. Thomas's will be welcome visitors to Kingsholm again.
