The Living Floodlights

The other day I wrote to the effect that there is no better scene in sport than a Kingsholm, packed to the rafters, two good teams in contention, and the sun shining. On reflection, I could be wrong. It's always good to see the Tigers at Kingsholm, and it's especially gratifying to be able to meet them, and their excellent travelling support, so soon after as fine a Leicester - Gloucester confrontation as has ever taken place, even against the background of a very long series of games which, over the years, has yielded much more than its fair share of thrills and incident.

It's nice to be able to set the record straight, too. It takes two to tango, as the lady sang, and we would be the first to acknowledge that Leicester's resilience, refusal to panic, and sheer professionalism when faced with a Gloucester XV who were playing out of their skins, contributed greatly to that epic Semi Final. The commentator who referred to the 'toothless Tigers' in his report on the game should be buried at a crossroads at midnight with a corner flag through his heart. He certainly shouldn't be allowed near a rugby ground again.

I was also fascinated to read that Catling scored a consolation try for Leicester in the 77th minute. One really does wonder, sometimes...

Many a lesser side than Leicester would have buckled when that mesmeric Emmerson - Catling try brought Gloucester back to within three points of the lead. I certainly wouldn't have fancied the chances of three or four top First Division sides at that point, but the Tigers stuck to the task in hand, and came away with the win. I do not, therefore, expect them to be any less formidable this evening than they were ten days ago. But then, Bath were at least as formidable, under similar circumstances, just about this time last year.

Thanks for a great Cup match, Leicester. And we hope that you - and all the contingent wearing Calton Road Junior School colours who travel with you - have just as good a time back at Kingsholm as you obviously did last time round.

I don't suppose we could persuade you to confiscate Joel Stransky's kicking boot, could we?
