There was a time when the final Kingsholm fixture of the season was a holiday occasion: usually a happy run-around against lesser opposition, followed by the occasional small sweet sherry in the Clubhouse. There was always a tinge of melancholy about it, because everyone was sorry to see the season come to an end, and, not infrequently, there were memorable moments.

Many people will recall the most emotional occasion of all, when Mike Burton, having announced his retirement, stood in front of the stand as John Watkins and his team paraded the John Player Cup around the ground, and, quite unashamedly, wept.

There was also the game - against Exeter, I think - where Gloucester scored seventeen tries and managed to convert just one of them. Keith Richardson was Captain that season, and ended that game by handing the ball to the ref. with a gesture towards the posts which graphically signalled; "Here! You have a go!"

Not like that nowadays. Here we are facing a League encounter which is likely to be as stern a test as we've faced all season. If ever a side needed the points, it's Bristol, and the best possible side, from their point of view, to take them from would be Gloucester. Points difference could be a factor, too, so I suspect that the Old Enemy will be running every chance they get.

At the time of writing, Bristol have just lost a challenge from a rampant London Irish, fresh from their triumphs over Harlequins and Leicester, so the issue of play-offs may be decided by the time you read this. Whether it is or it isn't, I'd like to assure everyone here from down the A38 that no one in Gloucester wants to see Bristol playing in the Second Division of what I suppose we must learn to call the 'Allied Dunbar Premiership' next season. We wouldn't even wish that fate on Bath, being of the firm opinion that a top division,

whatever the spin doctors like to call it, without all three West Country sides wouldn't be worthy of the name.

We all know that neither Bristol or Gloucester has some divine right to play First Division rugby, but the proverbial gut will be busted to make sure that both sides retain their hard-won status.

If Bristol are fated to feature in the play-off games, then I wouldn't be a bit surprised to see a contingent from Kingsholm going down to the Memorial Ground to lend their support to our fiercest and favourite opposition.

This season, of course, honours are even. We beat Bristol in the Cup, here at Kingsholm, and then went down, rather disappointingly, I thought, at Bristol. Both sides will want to win this season's 'One Upmanship Stakes', even without all the other considerations riding on the game. Gloucester will certainly want to end their Kingsholm season in style.

But when you come right down to it, this is only the latest installment in one of the most famous and long-standing rivalries in Rugby Union Football. There is always a special flavour about the Bristol game at Kingsholm, and I can't see that it will be diluted by the financial considerations which dominate every club's ambition to retain or achieve First Division status. We would shout just as loudly, drink beer with the opposing supporters just as enthusiastically, exchange barbed comments before, during and after the game, just as amiably, if this were what is euphemistically called a 'friendly'.

Let's keep that firmly in mind as we wish Bristol all the best for their nail-biting run in to the end of the season, and bid them a sincere welcome to Kingsholm, once again.

As long as they don't actually win.

To reach the Cup Semi Final for the second season in a row was a mighty bonus in terms of morale and prestige, but my head says that perhaps it was a good thing we didn't progress any further. I'm not sure that our lads are ready for the wide open spaces of Twickenham, probably in the sunshine, yet. We're still bearing the scars from the last occasion on which we were faced with that.

I happen to believe that, at Kingsholm, we

now have the makings of the finest side that I, for one, have ever seen at Gloucester. But that is a very fragile thing. It can be blown off course by old whole variety of factors, including the departure of various promising players.

And that's why the recent Special General Meeting was so important. Make no mistake. Without the finance we *shall* lose players. By the very nature of things, the best young prospects are ambitious, and so they should be. The career is very short by normal standards, there is the instinctive wish to have a settled family life, and always the risk of an enjury which might end playing days for good.

Against that background, even the most loyal performer is likely to receive an offer that he can't, in all good sense, refuse. Gloucester has to have the resources to fight off such depradations as long as possible, and make a few raids of our own.

After all, what are we celebrating here? A Great Revival, certainly, but when you come right down to it, we're just mightily relieved to have avoided play offs against some very good, cash-rich clubs who have bought themselves some very good sides. All very well, but, like the man said, no bloody way to run a railway. Like any other club worthy of the name, we should be aiming for the European competition, and for the League itself.

If Richard Hill, who knows this better than anyone, says we need a few more class players, then no one in their right mind will disagree with him.

I'm told that, by the time you read this, the name of our investor may well have been revealed. All I know is that it isn't me.

But welcome, whoever you are. We need you.

Seriously, though, they do a marvellous job and are an important part of the backroom team. Thanks both.





Points Mean International Places?

Mark Mapletoft takes off for Argentina in three weeks time with every chance of winning an England cap despite his status as the country's fourth-ranked fly-half behind Mike Catt, Paul Grayson and Alex King.

England's need for a back-up goalkicker during their six-match tour is such that he has only to stay in one piece to justify a place on the bench, at the very least, as essential cover for any one of a number of emergencies.

In an ideal world, Mapletoft would be going in his preferred position as a fly-half. His success at Gloucester this season, not least in front of goal, and an acute shortage of native place-kickers in the English First Division has persuaded Jack Rowell to call him up in his original position of full-back. The first and second choices, Tim Stimpson and Nick Beal, having been chosen by the Lions, England will surely reward Jim Mallinder with a cap at last at the age of 31. Should anything happen to him or, more to the point, to Catt, then Mapletoft will be called upon to kick the goals, as happened to another Gloucester full-back, Peter Butler, during England's tour of Australia back in the mid-Seventies.

In competitive domestic rugby this season, nobody can match Mapletoft's scoring power, not even Gareth Rees, the Canadian captain who has never been more accurate than over the last few weeks of Wasps' impressive surge towards the title. Only three other kickers in the top ten for the season are English, Grayson, Jon Callard, no longer a regular at Bath, and John Liley, even less of a regular in recent weeks at Leicester. In addition to Rees, five of the remaining nine have all been capped by other countries, Paul Burke (Ireland), Simon Mannix (New Zealand), Thierry Lacroix (France), David Humphreys (Ireland) and Joel Stransky (South Africa).

The try chart has more of an English ring to it, Darren O'Leary streaking ahead of the field with 26 in 25 Cup and League matches for Harlequins, including nine in three Pilkington ties against Cheltenham, Rotherham and Saracens.

Adedayo Adebayo, in joint second place with Tom Beim of Sale, the England under-21 wing now wanted by Wales, would surely have been closer had he not lost a month in mid-season because of concussion.
