THE LATE STANLEY BAYLISS

“Citizen” Fund Closed

Sum of Over £1493 Realised

[an additional donation of £7-7-0 from Redruth FC raised the total to £1,500-4-7½]

“The Citizen” Fund promoted for the benefit of the widow and child of the late Stanley Bayliss is now closed. Thanks to the response made to our appeal by the public, not only in the city and county but outside, the handsome sum of £1,492 17s 7½d has been realised, and this amount has been placed in the bank to the credit of the “Stanley Bayliss Fund” for subsequent investment at the discretion of the appointed Trustees.

Since the last list was published, a donation of £1 4s has been received as the result of a collection by Mr Frank Humphries, an old Gloucester boy at Penarth. The acknowledgement of £6 from Sidworth FC in last Saturday’s Football “Citizen” should have read Sidmouth.

Administration of the Fund

As previously announced in “The Citizen” the Trustees of the Fund are Dr Alcock, Messrs W T Pearce, A F Fielding, G H Bland, J T Brookes, C A F Ridsdale, Arthur Hudson and W H Madge. It has been decided that the total amount of the contributions shall be invested in such trust securities as the Trustees shall decide, and that the income shall be expended for the benefit of Mrs Bayliss and her son at the discretion of the Trustees. Should Mrs Bayliss re-marry the whole of the income will be appropriated for the benefit of her son.

The Trustees will be at liberty to use capital, in their discretion, for apprenticing the son to some trade or making provision for his advancement in a similar way. After her son has attained the age of 21 years the Trustees may, at any time, transfer the whole or part of the capital to him for his own use, should they consider it reasonable to do so. Such a step will not, however, be taken during the lifetime of Mrs Bayliss should she remain a widow.

Should there be any failure of the trusts, of which particulars have been given, any moneys or investments remaining in the hands of the Trustees will be transferred to the Gloucester Royal Infirmary for the endowment of a bed to the memory of Stanley Bayliss.
