

Don Caskie

Following Ian Smith's departure, Don is now the 2nd most experienced player at Gloucester with 34 tries from 191 appearances. Here we go then, that long-awaited expose of your favourite centre! Gasp in amazement as he plays down the Gloucester-Bath rivalry!

Old Spot: Well, that turned out to be a very close game against Wakefield - what happened?

Don Caskie: It didn't exactly go according to plan! We could easily have lost as we weren't playing very well, but the forwards gradually ground them down and we didn't allow them to play their game. It was a vast improvement on the Bristol game.

OS: How did you feel about Mike Wedderburn on Rugby Special talking about your "educated right foot?!!"

DC: Well, I think they were only there because they were expecting Wakefield to cause an upset!

OS: Did you have any preferences for your opponents for the next round?

DC: I was hoping for Saracens, but home against Sale wouldn't be bad - I didn't play in the Sale game at Kingsholm earlier this season.

OS: What about the league situation now - do you think we're out of relegation trouble?

DC: We've set ourselves a target of another 2 wins to make sure that we stay out of trouble. The loss against Bristol was a bit of a setback, but we've got to play them again as well as Northampton at home. We feel that 2 more wins would make us safe.

OS: How big is the gap between Gloucester and sides like Wasps and Harlequins - and what can Gloucester do to try and bridge that gap?

DC: On the day we're not too worried about playing anybody. We probably play better against more fancied opposition - especially now we have the confidence that we can win games. In fact we've not played that well in our last 7 or 8 games but we've managed to win. If we play well then there's no reason why we can't beat these sides - we shouldn't be too worried about the opposition. As far as what Gloucester can do to bridge the gap is concerned, Richard's philosophy - to bring on the young boys - is clearly working. You can't fault him and all credit to him and his coaching.

OS: Money is now a major factor in the game. Do you think it's benefited Gloucester?

DC: Well, we haven't really been affected by vast sums of money - we're still very much a young side and the players don't have to be paid too much. We had some star players here already, the problem is keeping them here, like Phil Greening for example. But in this professional age we're more focused now, we're determined to win and all the extra training we do has made us all a lot fitter.

OS: How has professionalism affected you personally?

DC: I've really enjoyed it. I didn't play at the beginning of the season but I'm back in now - touch wood! The people at work are very understanding of my rugby and it's sort of an added bonus. But at my age I can't afford to give up my 'real job' because I'm now in the twilight of my career!

OS: You mentioned you weren't included in the team at the start of the season - was that a very frustrating time for you, watching these new young full-timers come in who were queuing up to take your place?

DC: A few years ago I would have been very, very frustrated but it's understandable that in the next year or so Richard will be looking for someone to take my place. But Richard knows that I've got a lot of experience of Division One rugby and Cup competitions and he knows that I'm always available to him.

OS: You're one of the most experienced players at the club now, so hopefully you can give us a long-term perspective on the development of the club. When do you think were the best times at Gloucester?

DC: When I first came here we had Gadd, Teague and Smith who were all great players and we had a different sort of teamsmanship where we were a very close-knit group of friends. There's been a lot of change over these last 7 or 8 years. Now that camaraderie is coming back, but it's a very different sort than when I first came into it - I'm not saying it's the wrong sort, just very different.

OS: Yes, I get the impression that whenever I'm around the players after a match that the Gloucester forwards all tend to stick together and the backs all go off to their own separate groups. Do you think that sort of "Forwards' Clique" exists?

DC: Well, most of the Gloucester forwards are Gloucester boys, whereas the backs tend to be the imports - maybe that's a factor. But we're all still a very close-knit group at Gloucester and probably always will be.

OS: When were the real dark days at Gloucester?

DC: Two or three years ago we were going through a bad spell when we were always fighting off relegation. We had Barrie Corless here and the club seemed to lack any direction. Then Viv Wooley came in and brought back the Gloucester perspective and now Richard is very focused indeed! He believes in a philosophy and he knows how he wants things to be done. He's also prepared to admit when he's wrong and will do U-turns if necessary.

OS: Do you think that sort of single-mindedness can have it's disadvantages? Take the case of Ian Smith for example...

DC: Well, firstly you can't take anything away from Nathan Carter. He plays how Richard likes his open-sides to play. Ian plays a different style which is suitable for Scotland but not for Gloucester at the moment. But Ian will do very well wherever he goes. He's a good friend and it's just all very unfortunate how it turned out.

OS: What have been the highlights of your playing career?

DC: Obviously, getting selected for Scotland A for the first time was very special. Getting to play in the Cup Final a few years ago was also a highlight as was playing in that side that season. We were a very strong side and we had the feeling that we would never lose - and we're only starting to get that feeling back now!

OS: What do you remember about that Cup Final?

DC: It was a very hot day and I felt that we played better than we had against Nottingham in the semi-final when I remember that we felt that we'd played awfully. But it was very upsetting to have been washed aside by Bath like that.

OS: Not only losing in a Cup Final, but also losing to Bath!

DC: Well, I think that there's more animosity off the pitch than on it as far as Gloucester and Bath are concerned. I think the supporters dislike each other a lot but it's not really the same for the players!

OS: What do you think your main strengths and weaknesses are as a player?

DC: My strengths are my defence and my tackling and I guess I'm an old experienced head in the backs. I've built up a strong partnership with Martin Roberts which I think is going well. On the negative side I don't have the blistering pace of a Mike Peters but experience lets you judge angles better which sort of compensates. Still, it's not very often that someone will go past the outside of me - although having said that you'll probably see it happen in the next game now! It's also not very often that I go on the outside to make a break - I usually try and go through the middle.

OS: Who has been your toughest opponent over the years?

Edgar "Ted" Chandler

The sad news has reached Old Spot of the death of former Gloucester player, Edgar Chandler, who died on New Years' Day aged 86. Although he did not feature in many first team games, Edgar (also known as Ted), was involved with Gloucester for many years of his playing career, which took place during the 1930s.

Edgar was a man of the true Gloucester tradition which has always been so valued at this club. To start with, he was Gloucester born and bred, spending his whole life in Green Lane, Brockworth. He learnt the game playing for various local sides from the age of 12 before coming to Kingsholm in his twenties.

Of course, not only the game was very different back then, but the nature of the club and the lifestyle of the players could not have been more different than today's professional era. For example, players were expected to be much more adaptable when it came to sorting out who was to play in which position. The most extreme case involved Edgar, still recovering from a heavy drinking session with his team-mates at lunch-time, was roped into training in the afternoon where he was tried out at stand-off, full-back and prop! But even though Edgar was prepared to play either at scrum-half or fly-half, the first-team's half back partnership was so well established that Edgar found it difficult to break into the side. On the pitch, the "major ructions" that we see players getting involved in today were made to look like playground spats in comparison to how the players welcomed each other onto the pitch in the Thirties.

On one particular occasion before coming to Kingsholm, Edgar was involved in a local derby where, no sooner had the opposing side kicked off than his opposite number had simply raced across to him and punched him in the face! Needless to say, after a brief consultation with the rest of the team, the opponent in question emerged from the next passage of play after having several teeth punched out! That's not to say that rugby was an uncivilised game back then, after all, the players always had a chance to get together in the bar afterwards and let the alcohol dissolve any previous animosity between them!

However, the involvement of alcohol in those days was more than about getting plastered. In terms of the social aspects of the game, Edgar would often reminisce about the days of amateurism, when players really had a sense of being involved in a close-knit team which was well known and respected amongst the general community. It comes as little surprise then, to find out that Edgar was not the greatest fan of the financially obsessed professional era, with it's apparent disregard for tradition. In fact, it's interesting to compare the vast sums of money being paid to the nation's top players now, and the situation of players in the Thirties. On one occasion, after having played for Gloucester against the Oxbridge sides, Edgar even had to sell his match blazer so he could afford to socialise afterwards!

We send our condolences and best wishes to Edgar's family, who have sadly lost one of the true embodiments of the classic Gloucester spirit.

DC: Well, the Bath boys are always a bit of a pain, but I used to hate playing against Smith and Bucton of Saracens. Lawrence Smith was very big and Bucton was very quick so one of them would barge through and the other just picked the ball up and raced away!

OS: How do you rate somebody like Jeremy Guscott?

DC: You've got to respect him, but I've never felt intimidated by him. In fact, I quite like playing against him because you know what's going to happen. It's the tall, gangly ones who are the trouble, you don't always know what they're going to do. I normally end up having to tackle the full-back anyway!

OS: Well, talking of full-backs, how do you rate Chris Catling? He's got to be the find of the season! DC: Yes, he's come a long way and is a fine prospect for the future. He's a confidence player but perhaps he needs to put a bit more weight on!

OS: How do you think Gloucester's future looks over the next few years?

DC: We're building steadily now and we have to make sure that we continue in the right way this season and next, building on the foundations that Richard has put in place so that we can compete for the league and cup. I know that we've managed to reach the semi-finals of the cup, but realistically this was a year of rebuilding and laying the foundations for us to evolve and really start to compete.

OS: Do you think that Gloucester will need to buy in players?

DC: Well, Richard tends to have a good eye for young talent and he's in the perfect position in the England set-up to be able to attract new young players. Obviously, we can't make the whole team that young - we must build up gradually. But Richard's philosophy is working without buying imports. If players are young, proven internationals who have a passion to play for the club and are not just there for the money or to finish off their careers then that's OK. Buying in new players isn't a necessity at the moment.

OS: So much for the future of Gloucester, what about the future for Don Caskie?

DC: I've got a two-year contract and to be realistic, at this level and at this age I'm just enjoying playing in the first team and hopefully playing with the club next year. Then maybe I'll have to start playing in the lower divisions.

OS: Perhaps you could get involved in the coaching set-up at Gloucester?

DC: I'd love to be involved with Gloucester and pass on some of the experience I've got, but that's all still pie-in-the-sky stuff. My priority is to keep playing and help Gloucester in their rehabilitation period.

OS: How great a role do the supporters play? Are you aware of them when you're out on the pitch?

DC: When there's a lull you can always hear the comments and a lot of the banter. Then the crowd roars into action and that chanting mass of noise gees you up. It helps a lot - the hairs go up on the back of your neck when you're warming up and when you go out onto the pitch. It makes a hell of a difference, the crowd pick you up. You're aching like mad and they still manage to pick you up.

OS: Finally, do you have a message for the supporters?

DC: Just to say thank you very much for everything they do - it is appreciated by all the players - and if they keep on in the same vein then they can't go wrong!

OS: Thanks a lot for your time, Don....

Ol' Babber Looks Forward

After having been turned over at home by Sale (9-22) in their last competitive match, Northampton will be looking forward to "being able to concentrate on the league" and take further steps to achieving this season's aim – a four finish.

Northampton are the only opponents from the first division that Gloucester have yet to meet this season either home or away.
