Everyone who is connected with Gloucester will tell you that its a pity that Phil Greening hasn't been picked for the Lions. There may be some advantage to Gloucester!

This season started a full eight months ago - so much earlier than normal that it was the first time ever that a match had been played at Kingsholm during the month of August. The season finale will be the Pilkington Cup Final on the second Saturday in May - one week later than normal. But wait - for some teams the season will continue because there are promotion/relegation play-offs. 15 of the players selected for the Lions play for teams that could be involved - Bristol, Newcastle, Northampton, Richmond and London Irish are all candidates still. Indeed, will these players even be available for those play-offs? After all the Lions' first match is just 2 weeks after the Pilkington Cup Final.

Then follows a gruelling 13 match tour ending in July. So for quite a few players that will be the end of an 11 month season - they will barely have time to rest before they will need to start full training ready for yet another full-length season.

The implications are quite horrendous for teams like Leicester and Newcastle who are supplying fully one third of their squads for this tour. What will Rob Andrew and Bob Dwyer do should these players become incapacitated? Its a possibility - look at the number of players who were injured on the last Lions tour in 1980. It may well be true that the dawn of the professional era rings the death knell for the British Lions as so many commentators are predicting.

So perhaps the new season will start with some of Gloucester's rivals struggling to provide full opposition. Meanwhile a good proportion of our team will have learnt much from a quick tour to Argentina, rested well over the rest of the summer, enjoyed their 10-day tour of Italy and be raring to go come September.

Yes, every cloud does have a silver lining!

An Interview with Nathan Carter

Nathan Carter burst onto the Gloucester scene early in the season and since his debut he has hardly been out of the team. Off the pitch he is quiet and unassuming. On the pitch he is rapidly making a name for himself as a fierce competitor.

Old Spot: Nathan, you shot into the first team back in the autumn against Wasps - what had you been doing until then?

Nathan Carter: I'd played for Gloucester Colts and U21's and the County Colts and U21's. I was at Widden Old Boys for two years and then I went to the Gordon League. I went between there and Gloucester for the past three years.

OS: Has your life changed a lot since you started playing regularly for the Gloucester first team?

NC: Well its become a lot more hectic! I have to do a lot more training which also takes place earlier - sometimes from 3.00 in the afternoon which together with work makes a busy schedule!

OS: So you're not playing as a full-timer?

NC: I'm still part-time but I'm playing a lot more rugby than at the beginning of the season. I'm still working as a builder a couple of days a week. But if the opportunity comes along I'd certainly become a full-time player.

OS: Some Gloucester supporters, for one reason or another, seem to take this idea of "Glaws - born and bred" quite seriously. For those people who don't know you, could you set the record straight?

NC: I was born in Tredworth and moved to Hucclecote. I went to Brockworth School. My Mum and Dad and all my relations are all from Gloucester as well!

OS: Last weekend you had to face Leicester and Neil Back. How do you feel that went?

NC: It was OK. He was very quick and very strong but we retained a lot of our own ball which we were happy about. We watched the video of the match on Wednesday and when you've got time to see the whole match from a distance you could see that some of the referee's decisions were....'interesting'!!

OS: What happened at the back of the line-out? Why did Simon Devereux not seem to be able to get off the ground?

NC: Throwing to the back of the line-out has worked really well for us all season- its not something we do if things are going wrong. Simon was impeded a couple of times and the danger is, if you're like me, you're the man at the back who has to lift the jumper - if things go wrong then you've left a lot of space behind you for the opposition to run into.

OS: You've played against most Division One teams now - do any particularly tough opponents come to mind?

NC: Every game we've had this season has been hard, each game for a different reason. The atmosphere at Division One relegation dog-fights is a lot different to the atmosphere when you play against Wasps and Leicester - some games are more physical. You've just got to psyche yourself up in different ways for different matches.

OS: You're up against Richard Hill who's just been picked for the Lions. Are you looking forward to it?

NC: Yes! I haven't played against Saracens before and we owe them one from earlier this season. We want to put the cup defeat behind us as well!

OS: I suppose the danger is now that after having lost to Leicester in the semi-final and knowing that we only need one more win to be sure of staying up, the season might just drift to an end, save for the crunch match against Bristol.

NC: Well, there's no way that Richard Hill would let us drift along. He won't let anyone slack and if they do then personnel will change. We all want to keep winning our games - its not a nice feeling when you lose.

OS: Going back to the issue of the opponents you've come across this season - there's been a lot of talk that a no. 7 needs to be well over 6 ft to be successful. Do you think that's true?

NC: No I don't think its true. Perhaps the taller no. 7's were more effective a couple of seasons ago but now the rules have changes the no. 7's job must be to get to the break-down quickly. New Zealand, for example, have always stuck with an out-and-out open-side because they've always seen the need to retain the ball. Mind you, the guy they've got now is big *and* fast!

OS: have you always played at open-side?

NC: When I was at school I used to play at full-back and then at centre! I started playing flanker when I was 17 and then I played at blind-side for Widden before switching to open-side.

OS: You've got a tough few weeks coming up with 6 league matches in April. How are you going to cope?

NC: Well you've got to be mentally prepared - to be able to pick yourself up after the game and make sure you do effective training. Knowing when to rest is also very important as well.

OS: Do you think you'll play in all the games or will Andy Stanley come in for a couple of games?

NC: That's all up to Richard Hill. Stan has been there at no. 2 all season and I train with him a lot - there's some healthy competition there!

OS: As far as your own game is concerned, what are your strengths and what are the areas you want to work on?

NC: My strengths are in getting to the break-downs quickly and my work when I get there. I like to try and hit the opponent around at the break-down and I really like tackling. On the other hand I'd like to stay on my feet a lot more in the tackles and to get involved with the backs more, but we've been involved in a lot of tight games of late so the back row hasn't really been able to express themselves in the loose. But that will come along as the side develops.

OS: Has Richard Hill been a big help to you since he arrived at Kingsholm?

NC: Yes, especially when he takes us through the video analysis - you pick up on a lot of little things. John Brain has also helped us a lot with work on some of the finer details.

OS: There has also been a lot of talk about Ian Smith this season around the time of his departure. You were pushed into the background a bit - what do you think about all that happened?

NC: I've known Ian for a long time and he was fine with me, which was very good of him really. You hear about all the things which were supposed to be going on but I was just there to do a job and whatever happened was between them as far as I was concerned.

OS: But what we'd really like to know is whether you got his club car!!

NC: No!! I don't know what happened to that. Anyway I'm quite happy with the car I've got.

OS: What are your ambitions?

NC: Who knows? If the opportunities come along then I'd love to play representative rugby at the highest level that I can.

OS: Do you see yourself still at Gloucester in two year's time?

NC: I would hope so! You get a taste for playing at Gloucester and you want to try and fight to stay there.

OS: Thanks very much, Nathan.

NC: No problem.

A Free Lunch?

Old Spot is not normally a publication to deal with the twilight world of rumour and gossip, but we thought that on this particular occasion we could make an exception. Now, allegedly, in the upcoming special meeting for the club members, not only will the possibility of major financial backing be discussed, but a far more concrete proposal will be put forward which will see revolutionary changes coming to the club.

But how should the Gloucester supporters, respond to this? The decision the members could be asked to make would be the most far-reaching in the club's history! The issue is not, however, as simple as some people would have you believe because the problem is this: the club desperately needs a major financial injection to be able to compete in the professional era. But how can this be done so that the club still has control over its own affairs?

The fact that we need the money is surely not in question. Either we take the route that virtually every other club who will be in the First Division next season has taken, or we make a stand against professionalism and continue to attempt to be self-financing, not unlike relegation-doomed Orrell have done. The millionaire clubs are raising the stakes for everyone else as a players' transfer market develops along the lines of that seen in the Football Leagues. If Gloucester do not secure major financial support very soon then it is questionable how long players like Greening, Fidler, Benton, Mapletoft and Catling will settle for second best. They are, after all, ambitious young men and who are we to tell them that "club loyalty" should come before everything else? Being a rugby player is fast becoming a lucrative business and these rising stars are in the right place at the right time, and Gloucester needs to retain these players or else risk becoming a feeder for the elite clubs.

It must be frustrating for Richard Hill to steer the narrow path between success and survival. If the club is too successful that will only mean players will receive bigger and better offers from elsewhere, and yet Gloucester have to achieve enough points to stay in the First Division! If Richard Hill is to sign up to three established international players then he will need the means with which to do it. For better or worse, the honour of wearing the Cherry and White jersey in itself is not enough.

While it seems that it is obvious that the club needs extra funds, we have to be very careful about how this is done. Firstly, as far as the players are concerned, it is not unlikely that the professional bubble of inflated prices being paid for players, together with their wage payments, is set to burst within a relatively short period. This is because beyond the millionaire investors, the money simply isn't there to support it because, apart from notable exceptions such as Gloucester and Leicester, the clubs in England cannot boast of huge fan bases. So if we choose to join in with the professional merry-go-round it must be done sensibly. As with football, fading international stars - both from this country and abroadare coming to see the English game as a great way to pep up their pensions. As Richard Hill has already said, we need to strike a balance between obtaining players who are of proven ability, but who are also willing to play their hearts out for Gloucester - which means being able to play without being dazzled by the dollar signs in their eyes.

Of course, with cash comes control and expectation. Bath, for instance, were only too willing to accept Brownsword's money, but they could not deal with the huge weight of expectation that this "present" brought with it. Clearly investors are no innocent Good Samaritans who hand over the cash, say "Enjoy yourselves, kids!" and then disappear as quickly as they came. They obviously will want returns on their money and if they feel that these are endangered then they can exert influence on a cowering committee to change things - Bath again the obvious example. So whilst welcoming any investment, I would implore the Directors to ensure that Richard Hill is as protected as far as possible from any short-term worries the investors may have.

Above all else, Richard is the future of this club and everyone involved with Gloucester must see to it that he is supported in whatever he does. It is up to the Committee, the Directors and ultimately the membership to ensure that this club gets the investment it so badly needs but in a way that supports Richard and the players - not put pressure on them. In short we all have a responsibility to ensure that we learn from the mistakes of others so that, as far as is realistically possible, Gloucester gets the best of both worlds.

Liked Cricket – Formed A Rugby Club!

These days, the story is rarely told in the bar of Coney Hill Rugby Club. You see, just after the end of World War II a group of residents living in the suburb of Gloucester got together with the intention of playing cricket.

There was one problem. Winter was approaching and the cricket season was drawing to a close.

They formed a sports club and to while away the winter months they decided to play rugby. By the time that spring came around and the thoughts of the young men of Coney Hill turned to cricket, they said: "What the hell, let's keep a rugby club".

Coney Hill Rugby Football Club is now celebrating being, in cricket parlance, fifty not out.

The story of the founding of the rugby club first came out at the club's annual dinner in July 1956, which was reported in The Citizen on Wednesday July 18, 1956.

Jim Haines, the then chairman of the North Gloucester Rugby Combination, mentioned the story of how the Coney Hill club came into being and this was reported by The Citizen.

"One of Gloucester's best-known and yet young rugby clubs, Coney Hill, was originally intended to be a cricket club.

"This rather surprising information was given at the club's annual dinner, by Mr. Jim Haines, the newly-elected president of the North Gloucester Rugby Combination.

"Mr. Haines, who was proposing the toast of 'Coney Hill RFC' said that a number of enthusiasts wanted a regular game of cricket, but as the winter approached they formed a Rugby club instead."

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Ol' Babber Looks Forward

Just as you thought that you were safe from Southern Hemisphere kicking machines, another one turns up on your doorstep. Equally as deadly with the boot as Stransky, Michael Lynagh comes to Kingsholm looking to boost his team's chances of European competition next season. But even to have mentioned the words "Saracens" and "top four position" in the same sentence this time last season would have seemed rather strange, unless you were forecasting their likely position in Division Two by the end of this season. The fact is, Saracens, by the grace of the RFU and a couple of million quid, not only managed to claw their way up out of the relegation trap-door, but have also succeeded in transforming their team into the standard cosmopolitan line-up rapidly becoming the norm in the top-flight. Put bluntly, we may have fond memories of the "winner-takes-all" game that was the corresponding fixture last year, but Saracens are a much improved side now and Gloucester must be under no illusions.

Gloucester will have to finally start to learn the lessons dished out to them in the last few weeks by Paul Burke, Gareth Rees and Joel Stransky. If they don't we could see Gloucester being literally kicked out of a game they are well capable of winning - and all through "overeagerness". Conceding tries has not been the problem over recent weeks but ensuring they don't happen through constant infringements has! Not only must Gloucester begin to be confident enough in their defensive abilities to be able to stand off that extra yard, but they must suss out the referee more quickly and effectively. In matches we have seen at Kingsholm - and not only this season - it is the side who can best "play the referee" which normally comes out on top. In the Shed, we can all question the referee's ancestry until we're blue in the face, but perhaps, in the cold light of day, we should be willing to admit that perhaps Gloucester aren't as good as exploiting the referee (which is different from "cheating") as other sides.

Although star names such as Sella and Pienaar have been brought to Enfield, Saracens' strengths remain much the same as last year. Their major strong points are at the heart of the side in the back-row and half-back. Saracen's back-row line-up is particularly impressive with Hill, Diprose, and Pienaar always on hand both in attack and defence. Forever on the fringes of the England team, Bracken is also regaining his form and Benton will have yet another great opportunity to prove his credentials against a credible opponent. As for Lynagh, he will be looking to emulate the points tallies achieved by many kickers against Gloucester this season! One often underrated player who could also cause some problems is the full-back Tunningley. He played a blinder in Saracens' last match when they notched up a half-century against the hapless West Hartlepool. Yet I would expect Gloucester to enjoy their usual dominance in the scrums and line-outs and the back-row showed how they can match some of the best when they successfully neutralised Back and Co. last Saturday.

But Gloucester's biggest obstacle this afternoon could well be themselves. The players and supporters are bound to be disappointed after having come so close to Twickenham and the team may find it difficult to reach the same levels of intensity. Add the fact that everyone is aware that, realistically, Gloucester only need one more win to secure their place in Division One and that the match here at Kingsholm against Bristol will decide that particular issue, then this game could drift away in favour of the side who have realistic European ambitions. So the question is, after Leicester, are Gloucester mentally tough enough to bounce back?
